Fellow Red Eagles: Commander's Call

Thirty years ago (July 1979) the Red Eagles started flight operations at the Tonopah Test Range when 8 jets showed up on initial to land. The 4477th Test and Evaluation Flight was equipped with 2 MiG-17s and 6 MiG-21s. We also had 3 Cessna 404s and a Kenworth tractor.

The initial cadre of people, the jets, the facilities and the equipment were assembled by 29 men under the leadership of Glenn Frick, the first commander. Glenn got the ball rolling, got promoted and then was reassigned to the US Mission in Egypt to help the Egyptians crank up an F-4 program which replaced their MiG-23s.

I have often wondered what happened to those Egyptian MiG-23s and about the role Glenn might have had in their disposition. It is easy to let your imagination run wild with that one!

The team of people that Glenn assembled was not only without equal in terms of mechanical talent; the team was also without equal in the ability to work together and to select others to join the Red Eagles. Men were carefully selected that possessed the same qualities.

In my 26 years of active commissioned service nowhere else did I see the equal of the team of men in the 4477th. Every minute spent working with the Red Eagles was truly a joy.

In April 2009 I asked Tommy Karnes to his face, "How do you take a wrecked MiG-21 and build it into a safe flying machine." Tommy replied, "It's easy Boss, you just take it apart, figure out what don't work right, fix what's broken and put it

back together again."

It's hard to believe I had missed something that simple!

By the time Phil White relinquished command to Jack Manclark, by Phil's count, he had over 400 assigned personnel including a Chief who was the First Shirt. At the peak in 1987 Jack had 27 MiGs, although not all were flyable at the same time.

This unit played a role in the United States of America's victory over the USSR in the Cold War. Further, the unit provided the training to our United States Air Force, Navy and Marine combat fighter forces that led to the air war successes during the Gulf of Sidra shoot downs in 1981 and 1989, Desert Storm in 1991 and the follow-on Iraqi operations. The Red Eagles also had measurable influence indirectly during the war over Kosovo.

It is my hope that the veterans of the 4477th TES will band back together and participate in a Red Eagle Alumni Association that publishes a newsletter of important info to us all, keeps a personnel roster up to date, and also sponsors periodic reunions and smaller but more frequent local social gatherings. Perhaps we need "Line Chiefs" around this great country to volunteer to take charge in their own backyards, figure out who lives close by and lead the way locally.

Paul Cox has worked long and hard here in Vegas, largely by himself, to collect and organize squadron roster information. I think we have now folded all of the
